

# Business English Word Of The Day

## Leverage

**/ 'lev.ər.ɪdʒ /**

**Example:** *We can leverage our network to expand into new markets.*

**Fun Fact:** Often used in business to mean 'use to maximum advantage'.



## Travel English Word Of The Day

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### Itinerary

/aɪˈtɪn.ər.ər.i/

**Example:** *Our itinerary includes visits to three cities.*

**Fun Fact:** From Latin 'itinerarium', meaning 'journey'.



# Learning English Word Of The Day

**Cat**

/kæt/

**Example:** *The cat is sleeping.*

**Fun Fact:** The word "**cat**" is one of the few words that sounds very similar in many languages!

For example:

English: **cat**

Dutch: **kat**

German: **Katze**

French: **chat**

Spanish: **gato**



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## Casual English Word Of The Day

**Chill**

/tʃɪl/

**Example:** *Let's chill this weekend.*

**Fun Fact:** The word "**chill**" can mean **cold**, but it's also a popular **slang word** in English!

People often say "**Let's chill**" to mean "**Let's relax**" or "**hang out.**"

So, "chill" can describe the weather *and* your weekend plans!



# Phrasal Verb of the Day

**Look after**

**/lʊk 'æf.tər/**

**Example:** *I look after my little brother.*

**Fun Fact:** The phrasal verb "**look after**" means **to take care of** someone or something.

Even though it has the word "**look**", it's not just about seeing — it's about **being responsible!**



# Idiomatic Expression of the Day

## Hit the books

/hɪt ðə bʊks/

**Example:** *I need to hit the books tonight.*

**Fun Fact:** The phrase “**hit the books**” doesn’t mean you should actually hit anything!

It’s an **idiom** that means **to start studying seriously**.

It’s a fun way to say you’re getting focused and ready to learn!



## Mini Grammar Tip

### There, Their, They're

**Tip:**

**Their** = shows **possession** (belongs to them)

*"That's their house."*

**There** = refers to a **place** or is used to **introduce something**

*"The book is over there."*

*"There are many reasons to learn English."*

**They're** = **they are**

*"They're going to the park."*

**Example:** They're going to their house over there.

**Fun Fact:** These three words are **homophones** — they sound the same but have **different meanings and spellings**. English has many homophones, which can be tricky but also fun to master!



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
